40 YEARS OF POSITIVE IMPACT



A Message from OEF Board Chair **Sue Hallman**

For almost 40 years, the Okemos Education Foundation (OEF) has proudly partnered with the community to financially support excellence and innovation in the classroom. Because of your donations, we have been able to positively impact classrooms through various grant opportunities for teachers, as well as provide special programming to enhance the educational experience of our students.

The 20-21 school year presented unique and unprecedented challenges for all of us, including the OEF. As a result of the pandemic and in an effort to keep our students, staff and families safe, our students engaged in learning through a virtual classroom environment. Because of this, traditional needs changed resulting in funding of grants and other programs being paused. This year we are so excited to resume funding for those grants and programs as well as provide additional funding for new projects! Details of current and future initiatives are highlighted throughout.

• In just the first four months of school we have awarded over \$5,000 in teacher grants, almost \$1,000 for a Lee Gerard Professional Development grant, \$6,000 to our six Commitment to Excellence award recipients, and funded a three day field trip to the MSU Children's Garden for all 4th grade students in two schools at a cost of \$1500. In addition, we are very excited to be partnering with the district in support of the diversity, equity and inclusion goals of the district's strategic plan. To that end we have committed \$10,000 for the DEI Initiative (see pg 14)

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- Future funding from the OEF includes two more opportunities, February and May, for teachers to apply for our larger grants, on-going opportunities to apply for smaller grants, additional MSU field trips for 4th graders in the other two schools, as well as financially assisting the elementary schools and Kinawa with their science fairs. And, once again we have committed \$2500 for a well known children's author to visit all students in all four elementary schools in March. This is one of our most popular programs and the children love it! (This amount is matched by Horizon Bank for a total of \$5,000 - thank you!)
- For any professional, learning and growing in your field is critical. To that end the OEF has partnered with Marcia Tanner, a former English teacher at the high school, and her husband Bruce, to offer a professional development grant. This grant, up to \$2,000 a year, will be extended to current English teachers at the high school. We are grateful to be able to provide this opportunity for excellence.

The OEF continues to work closely with the administration and the School Board. Given our ever changing educational environment, additional needs throughout the district will be identified. In response, the OEF will determine our role in providing support to address these needs. We look forward to enhancing excellence and innovation for our students in new ways.

Recognizing excellence is another focus of the OEF. We believe it is important to honor, recognize and celebrate excellence in our staff. We were thrilled to return to the Kellogg Center for our annual Commitment to Excellence Banquet in November honoring six staff members. These recipients were nominated by staff/parents/guardians for their role in educating with excellence. (More information about this process along with banquet pictures are included in this newsletter.)

We also encourage parents/guardians to celebrate the excellent staff throughout our district. The APPLE Award (Amazing Performance in Promoting Learning and Excellence) offers an opportunity for parents/guardians to communicate their appreciation for someone who has positively impacted their child(ren).

Supporting EXCELLENCE In Education Through Our OEF GRANTS!

The OEF focuses on enhancing educational opportunities in the schools by providing grants to staff to support excellence and innovation in their teaching. This fall the OEF has already committed almost \$6,000 in the following grants to OPS teachers.



These picture books are utilized to explore various character traits centered on diversity, equity, inclusion, social emotional learning, and self-awareness.

Character Building Lindsey Price, Cornell Elementary

As part of a school-wide character building and behavior management program, Cornell Elementary will be purchasing 45 diverse and age-appropriate picture books highlighting important and desirable character traits of each individual. These picture books will be utilized to explore various character traits centered on diversity, equity, inclusion, social emotional learning, and self-awareness. This \$855 grant will be utilized to help students learn and explore these valuable traits as well as gain exposure to rich and diverse literature. Students will have the opportunity to see themselves as characters, authors, and illustrators of these selected books, as well as their individual differences highlighted, and their diverse identities reflected in the chosen picture books. Students will also have opportunities to hear and share differing and unique voices and perspectives promoting equity and inclusion. Cornell Elementary is so excited to begin this work, and so grateful for the support of the **Okemos Education Foundation** for their help in making this project possible!

Salmon in the Classroom Tank 2 Canister Filter Grant

Paul Hinze, Kinawa

For over 10 years Paul Hinze has been a part of the Salmon in the Classroom program at Kinawa. This program partners with Michigan's DNR, allowing schools to raise Chinook Salmon (King Salmon) in the classroom from egg to fry as part of a hands-on learning opportunity. From November to May 5th grade students learn the life cycle of one of the most popular fisheries in the Great Lakes. Kinawa has integrated salmon in the classroom as a part of their ecology curriculum, learning about predator-prey relationships, invasive species and human conservation and impacts.

Two years ago, David Pruden, another 5th grade teacher at Kinawa, received training in the program adding another licensed teacher. This added license doubled the opportunity for more 5th graders to experience the program and in 2020

Kinawa worked again with Preuss Pets to obtain a 2nd tank. Steve Oberg from Preuss offered an old lobster tank that needed TLC for free and Mr. Hinze put in some sweat equity to take an outdated aquarium and get it ready for the program at Kinawa.

Last year, tank 2 raised 150 salmon fry successfully, but the existing sump filtration system did not clean well and had a loud constant sound like someone was brewing coffee in the classroom. The tank required more maintenance and because it was an "open" system there was always the fear of overflow.

Approval of this \$400 OEF grant upgrades tank 2 with a new canister filtering system. This upgrade will assure a closed system that can't overflow and is cleaner and quieter. Now Kinawa has 2 tanks raising approximately 300 salmon that are very efficient and will give all 5th graders a more hands-on experience learning about Michigan's salmon. Thank you OEF!




World Language E-lit and Novels *Kim Floyd, OHS*

The World Language Department at Chippewa Middle School and Okemos High School received a grant of \$1000 from the OEF towards purchasing e-literature and easy-reader novels for their French, German and Spanish classes. The teachers will use these materials to increase student fluency in the language of study. The e-literature will be particularly helpful for students to practice from home. Both the e-lit and novels are written for students who study language, and use language appropriate to their ability levels. Merci beaucoup, vielen Danke, and ¡muchas gracias!

Elementary PE Teachers In-School Bowling Sets

The Elementary Physical Education Team is very thankful to purchase new sets of bowling lanes! They are excited to purchase their own bowling sets to have on hand which they utilize within each elementary school (Hiawatha, Cornell, OPM at Central Montessori, and Bennett Woods). The bowling set comes with ten pins per lane, a twenty foot carpet mat, a rubber bowling ball, and an extra-large carry bag to support all the equipment.



curricular unit that includes mathematics when calculating scores, English skills when reading the signs for traveling amongst the bowler, score keeper, pin setter, and ball returner rotation, as well as Physical Literacy. Bowling improves underhand throwing skills, concentration, focus and target work, math, and computing (when calculating strikes and spares), teamwork and communication. This \$989 grant will greatly enrich our curriculum as we encourage students to be healthy and physically active citizens of society. Lee Gerard Grant for Professional Development ASD PFT Training

By receiving this \$600 grant Jamie and Abby are able to cover the cost of being trained as teachers who use Practical Functional Analysis in their classroom. The professional development is 45 hours of training focusing on increasing student communication and decreasing aggressive behavior all while continuing to preserve the dignity of the students. They are excited to begin learning and implementing programming for their classrooms. Sharing what has been learned with other pertinent staff is a critical component of receiving the Lee Gerard PD Grant. Once the training has concluded Jamie and Abby will collaborate with other staff to train them on the use of this assessment.

3-D Printer

In March of 2020, teachers in the East Lansing School District called upon neighboring districts with 3D printers to join forces to 3D print masks for healthcare professionals. A team of Okemos teachers organized by then OHS Assistant Principal Andrea Hallead took to action. Teachers Paul Hinze (Kinawa), Julie Tomczak (Kinawa), Mark Tomczak (Chippewa), and Dean Buggia (OHS) retrieved their printers from school and started printing masks to aid the effort.

The OEF generously stepped in to offset costs incurred by the project and to offer their assistance for future wear and tear of the machines.

Over the course of a month, the team printed well over a few hundred masks for local healthcare workers and was successful in delivering them to the people in need. This year the OEF purchased a new printer and paid for new parts for another printer. Thank you to the Okemos teachers and to the OEF during this challenging time.






Updating the Elementary Library Collection

With this money new books for the library will be purchased that will include books about countries that are underrepresented in the library as well as books that support the STEM curriculum. Some of the books chosen are ones whose characters are children with multicultural experiences that may differ from the school's student population to help educate and bring awareness to the students about how people live around the world.



The pandemic has had a huge affect on schools' ability to purchase new materials for the library in terms of being unable to hold book fairs, which is an important source of book purchasing. Mrs. Langley says she cannot stress enough how excited she is to be receiving this

grant as she continually works to update the library collection so the students have access to the most up-to-date materials for their enjoyment as well as for classroom projects they do.

Update from the Superintendent

Welcome to 2021 - 2022! Despite the challenges of the past year and a half, Okemos continues to move forward in maintaining and expanding upon the excellence it is.

The district has applied for Federal and State of Michigan COVID grant relief funds intending to help offset the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic on K-12 learning. Community members were invited to a follow-up town hall meeting regarding COVID relief funds on December 7th to further identify areas for spending.

In a follow-up to the initial OPS facilities and grounds survey sent out last month, the district gathered stakeholder input regarding our current grade level configurations. Community feedback regarding grade level configuration across our facilities will help to inform the district's planning for a potential November 2022 bond.

The OPS Student Mascot Committee received community input on potential names for our new district mascot. In December, a follow up survey will go to the community to further narrow down names shared in the initial survey. The student committee will utilize those results and have the secondary school students provide additional input to inform the selection process which is planned to be completed by February.

We value each of your diverse voices in our processes. Thank you for taking time to share your perspectives and inform our work!

BOND FACTS

The Okemos Public Schools Board of Education is considering a 2022 bond proposal. With continuation of the current millage rate, the district has a significant opportunity to re-imagine the future, to accommodate long-term enrollment increases and the aging building infrastructure.







Why is this Important Now?

While planning for the 2019 bond, it became clear that if enrollments continued to increase, a comprehensive process would need to be taken to review enrollment trends, neighborhood composition and potential solutions to create a longer-term plan. Today, the district has a unique opportunity to generate significant funds for improvements, with no change to the current tax rate.

The 2019 Bond improved significantly the technology, transportation and comfort of the schools, along with some building focused updates. This next bond could focus more on the "bricks and mortar" side of creating modern and equitable places for student learning and growth.

Reinvesting in the district is also aligned to the 2020-2024 Strategic Plan. Some 15% of respondents to the strategic plan survey indicated that "Aging Facilities" was one of the top 2-3 greatest challenges facing the district in the next 5 years. In response, the plan identified "Priority 10: Provide high quality and equitable facilities and learning environments for students, staff and community."

What is the Timeline?


This fall, the district will invite feedback from the community, staff, administrators, and the Board of Education. An update to the facilities assessment as well as best practices in educational environments is also underway. In the winter, we will engage a steering committee of a broad cross-section of district stakeholders. Inputs will include the community survey, facilities study, input from community forums – to be held in the winter and spring—enrollment and budget projections and other resources to develop a recommendation for consideration by the Board. It is anticipated that a bond proposal could be prepared for consideration by the voters on the November 2022 ballot.

Prior Bond Programs

- May 2021 Building Site and Sinking Fund: Votershave supported a sinking fund in the district for the past 30 years. In May 2021, voters approved the continuation of a \$1.4 million per year building and site Sinking Fund for use in repairing facilities, making site improvements to school buildings, playgrounds, athletic facilities and other site structure as well as school security and technology improvements.
- May 2021 Non-Homestead Operating Millage: Non-homestead funding for district programs has been in place since 1994, following the passage of Proposal A. Voter approval is required periodically to continue that support and was granted once again in May 2021, thereby providing funds to support the operational budget for schools, salaries, textbooks and the like.
- o May 2019 Bond Program: As bond funds from a 2013 millage were coming to an end, an extensive collaboration process kicked off in 2017 to assess the current technology, security, capital outlay, transportation and facility needs throughout our district. It resulted in a bond proposal that was approved by voters to continue the tax rate of 7.0 mills and generate \$24.9 million. This bond funded "1 to 1" student learning devices, replacement of classroom technology, the purchase of flexible classroom furniture, air-conditioned learning environments district-wide and the purchase of musical instruments, athletic equipment and other improvements to learning facilities.

How Does Our Tax Rate Compare?

At 7.0 mills, the current rate is among the sixth lowest level in Ingham County. The district does not intend to change the current tax rate with the potential 2022 bond program, but rather continue at the current level.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI)

Diversity, Equity, and inclusion (DEI) work is all about improving our systems to make sure they are effective for and responsive to each and every one of our students, no matter what identities and characteristics they bring with them to school.

To support the district's equity plan, we must develop equity-oriented educators within our system. Equity-oriented educators are people who possess critical consciousness and are committed to social justice. Critical consciousness is "The willingness and ability to see how power and privilege are at work to systematically advantage some while disadvantaging others" (Radd & Kramer, 2013). Building critical consciousness involves learning how to recognize implicit bias and understanding how power and privilege impact our students, and it will help us create a system that better addresses the needs of all of our students.

The Okemos Education Foundation will be funding two learning opportunities to develop the critical consciousness within our leaders and other staff members:

Eastern Michigan University - Leading for Equity and Justice Certificate - District administrators and directors will take a 36-hour course grounded in social justice and culturally responsive leadership. They'll gain new strategies to build better relationships with students and families, rethink their policies and practices, and examine their mindsets and dispositions that impact student success.


Justice Leaders Collaborative - The Core Course for Educators: An Introduction to Social Justice - Approximately 60 staff members will participate in this intensive 16-hour seminar designed to deepen their understanding of and commitment to equity, inclusion, diversity and social justice along lines of race, class, gender, sexual orientation, religion, and ability.

In addition to these trainings, here are some of the other DEI initiatives currently underway in the district:

- The Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Advisory Coalition held its first meeting to start the process of revising the district's equity plan.
- The OHS ACTION & CONNECT groups are mentoring students new to the district.
- We have a new interpretation service called Language Line that can support us with 240 languages.
- A monthly cultural overview is sent to staff to highlight major holidays and events that are likely to connect with our curriculum.



- Students in grades
 4-12 experienced a common mascot lesson
 that explains what a mascot is and why it's important, why we're changing our mascot, and what the steps will be in choosing a new one.
- Okemos Public Montessori teachers have been collaborating with Nokomis staff to develop lessons about Native Americans for 3rd and 4th graders.
- We are working on developing a common Culturally Responsive Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (CRPBIS) system for grades PreK-4.
- We are working on a process and policy for making sure we consistently honor students' pronouns and chosen names.




Media and technology have gone so far above and beyond to continuously support us as teachers and our students. We could not have survived this last year without all of their


2020-2021 FINANCIAL REPORT

Supporting the district through funding of teacher grants, field trips, author visit, etc. were suspended last year due to virtual learning. This year we have resumed these programs as well as adding special projects. To date we have committed \$12,000 in grants, \$1500 in field trips, \$2500 for our annual elementary author visit and \$10,000 to go toward the district's DEI initiative. Teacher grants (totaling more than \$25,000) and other programs are available throughout the year.
