t the 2008 OEF Awards Banquet last November, we were pleased to announce the creation of the *Connie Osborn Deits Science Enrichment Fund*. This fund represents a powerful example of the spirit of giving, one that demonstrates the unselfish desire to support the education of all of our children.

Tom and Connie Deits worked on science outreach for many, many years both inside and outside the district. Their son Robin attended Edgewood Elementary, Kinawa Middle School and graduated from Okemos High School in 2007. While Robin was at Edgewood, Connie and Tom served on the committee that ran the science fairs and then they moved on to the Science Olympiad program at Kinawa and Okemos High School. For many of those years they were instrumental in their involvement with the district's parent group, Supporters of Okemos Science, and Science Fun Day, a wonderful science outreach event held for all ages each year in Okemos. Even with Robin now in his sophomore year at MIT. Connie and Tom continued to be involved with Science Fun Day each year.

Sadly, Connie passed away in early 2008. Because Connie and Tom had talked about the science enrichment needs in the dis-

Message from our Superintendent

s we come to the end of the 2008-09 school year, the Okemos Public Schools continue to be a successful school district through the strong support of the school community and staff. We continue to:

- achieve Adequate Yearly Progress and receive "A" ratings;
- offer an exceptional educational experience that includes opportunities in arts, athletics, clubs drama, and music;
- preserve our facilities and improve our instructional resources through the community-approved Technology and Transportation Bond funding and the Building and Site Sinking Fund; and,
- maintain an adequate fund balance to protect the financial stability of the district.

The "together" in the district's mission statement signifies the important partnership between school and community. The community stepped forward this year through a long-range planning process to maintain our excellence and make difficult financial decisions that will benefit all students and create a district for the future. On May 11, the Board of Education voted to keep 3 traditional elementary schools open as K-4 buildings and configure a 5-6 building and a 7-8 building in 2010-2011. As a result, Central Elementary and Ward-cliff Elementary will close at that time. It is the Board of Education's wishes that what is good at all schools is honored and combined for the future of our students. I hope that this very brave and bold vote on the part of the board serves as a unifying factor for our district and paves the way for a solid future. Once again thank you to all for your efforts during the entire process.

Please know that the Central and Wardcliff staff, parents, students, and community are in our thoughts. Be assured that as I have spoken with parent groups, staff and community members, that all are concerned with the transition process and have expressed the desire to be included and provide assistance.

We are one district with one mission and care deeply for all who are part of the Okemos Schools. We will spend next year supporting transition efforts to make this decision successful.

I am pleased to note that even in these difficult economic times, the Okemos staff has completed goals set forth for this year as well as focused on becoming professional learning communities, committed to the learning of each student. We continue to

examine the challenge of how to find the "time" necessary for collaborative teams whose members work interdependently to achieve common goals linked to the purpose of learning for all.

OEF 2008-09 Annual Financial Report

The Okemos Education Foundation hopes you will help us play a critical role in helping our kids as our school district transitions to a new financial reality. As Okemos Public Schools' funding becomes more constricted, we believe it is important for our supporters to have a clear under-

standing of what OEF financial resources are available and how they are used. Our primary source of income is the annual Partners in Education Fall Fundaising drive. So far this year, we have raised over \$55,000. These funds help fund our annual grants and awards (see details on page 6) as well as our long-term endowment. We hope that we can count on your support in the future as we have in the past. Every contribution (large or small, new or ongoing) does make a difference for our kids! Thank you for your support.

As of 5/20/09, the OEF had the following fund balances:

General Fund: \$44,551



Temporarily Restricted Funds – Outstanding Grant/Award Obligations: \$38,281

Permanently Restricted – Endowment Fund: \$161,116

Our general and temporarily restricted funds are used to fund OEF grants, awards and program costs.


Our endowment fund is managed by Pension Trend Investment Advisors and will be used to fund future grants and awards.

This school year OEF donors have supported innovative teaching and learning approaches that are as diverse as our students' needs and interests.

To learn science, become a scientist!

If you've been listening to the debates about American education, you've probably heard that our children lag behind students in many developed nations when it comes to science and math. Your donations are closing this gap by helping students move beyond textbook explanations and begin practicing science.



High school chemistry and biology students are now using two spectrophotometers funded by OEF grants to measure light intensity, allowing them to perform many additional lab experiments, including a number that are recommended for students taking Advanced Placement science courses and examinations.

Two-dimensional diagrams are a second-best way to understand molecules, so another OEF grant is allowing science teachers and students to construct three-dimensional models of protein, carbohydrate and fat molecules and strands of DNA.

Using Calculator Based Rangers (CBR2's) funded by another OEF grant, 8th graders gather and analyze real world data, solve equations, create graphs and tables, and then share their results with classmates and teachers on classroom Smartboards.

Too often, students wonder how or if they'll ever use the math they're mastering in the classroom. Thanks to the OEF-supported **Elementary Engineering Program**, a number of 3rd graders now have an answer to that question. Every two or three weeks, they begin a new engineering project using materials purchased with the grant that reinforces data collection, geometry and computation skills. The projection of the projection o

ects also strengthen their collaboration and problem solving skills, which will be invaluable when they begin tackling real world problems 12 or 13 years from now.

Thanks to the **Connie Osborn De**its **Science Enrichment Fund** we were able to fund two more projects that transform science lessons in the kind of fun learning that stretches minds.

- The Hands On Family Science Night program brings elementary students, their younger siblings and parents together to conduct experiments, review student science projects, and explore scientific concepts, assisted by high school student volunteers and an OHS science teacher.
- Middle school students at Kinawa are now learning first hand about plant structure and reproduction and the chemistry of plant nutrition in a greenhouse funded by the Deits fund. The greenhouse will provide healthy plants that will replace invasive species with native plants on the Kinawa grounds.



More than just science... Speaking a foreign language is going to be a key skill in a shrinking world, and the OEF-funded purchase of Rosetta Stone software allows high school students to improve their command of French during lunch hour, Flex periods, and before or after school.

In a world where knowledge will increasingly be created with collaborators around the globe using the Internet, the ability to produce, record and share information electronically is becoming ever more important. An OEF grant is allowing middle school language arts and social studies students to use **Digital Storytelling Technology** to hone those skills.

Of course, the most essential skill our children need to master is still reading, and we're funding a series of projects aimed at helping every Okemos student become a fluent reader.

Several grants have purchased leveled readers allowing teachers to provide high-interest books to elementary students with varying levels of reading proficiency and English Language Learner materials for our middle school students from Asia, Africa and Eastern Europe who need to catch up with their classmates. Other reading-related grants have equipped teachers with technological



tools to help struggling readers, including Alpha Smart word processors, S.P.I.R.E (a multisensory language arts program), phonics tiles, and auditory accommodation systems that provide special needs students with a more level playing field while taking tests.

A Lee Gerard Professional Development Fellowship given to high school resource teachers will allow them to attend a conference this summer where they will learn more about how to improve parent communication skills and give parents effective verbal strategies for relating to their children. In the fall and beyond, these teachers will present their findings to parents and staff.

One of the best things about these and other grants we've made this year is that they will continue to provide our students with powerful learning experiences for years to come. **OEF**
