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# IN MEMORY Dr. Lee Gerard

On October 4, 2023, Dr. Lee Gerard, a man who embodied excellence in education, passed away. Dr. Gerard came to the district as Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction. When Dr. Wertz retired as Superintendent, Dr. Gerard was asked to step in on an interim basis. After working with him in this role, staff and parents alike urged him, and the district, to make the position permanent. He agreed and served in that capacity for two more years before retiring.

Lee, as he told everyone to call him, was a one of a kind person. He was selfless, caring, a listener, patient, wise, empathetic, and he maintained a collaborative culture of trust and respect. To know him was to know a truly great man. Lee was well loved in the community and I can say with almost complete certainty that no one had an unkind word to say about him.

In honor of Dr. Gerard, the Okemos Education Foundation named a professional development grant after him. The Lee Gerard Professional Development Grant was created a number of years ago for the express purpose of educators engaging in collaborative PD work to better support learning in the classroom.

Dr. Gerard, we thank you for your exemplary service to this district and to other educators. You were an amazing educator, administrator and person and we are grateful that you chose to work in the Okemos Public Schools.

### **Seeds of Science**


Each year the OEF provides financial support, which includes transportation and admittance, for every fourth grade student to attend MSU's Seeds of Science field trip. This is a hands-on experience that aligns with our fourth grade science curriculum.

At the heart of Seeds of Science are curiosity and wonder. Everything that happens before, during and after the field trip to the 4-H Children's Gardens is designed to come from curiosity and wonder. It is our firm belief that if we can generate and encourage curiosity and wonder in our visitors, the specific content knowledge will follow. Students that are curious and wonder about the activities they are engaged in will meet and exceed our expectations. They will make connections that we have not thought about and they will connect science to their daily lives in meaningful ways. Basically, they will be scientists.

- Everything starts with questions and then students are encouraged to explore to find
- Extended time in the garden. Seeds of Science visits last all day and are three visits long.
- Students do "authentic experiments" experiments that are the same as, or very closely modeled after, the experiments that scientists at Michigan State University are doina.
- Elegant technology integration. We use a variety of technologies to enhance and expand the hands-on experiences in the garden.

### **DeltaMath**

I received an OEF Grant to purchase the Integral Version of DeltaMath to use with my students last year. The students loved using the program! One of the hardest parts of completing math homework is not being able to check your answers and know if you are correct in your calculations. Another difficult part of homework is that students always say they can do it while in class with the teacher, but once they leave the room, they forget or get lost easily. Deltamath solves both of those problems!

Students get to have their answers checked as soon as they submit it and if they need more explanation before submitting an answer, there are step by step examples and videos of similar problems to remind them of what they have to do. I saw an increase in performance on assessments after using Deltamath for the assignments and students felt more confident! Thank you OEF for making it possible to use this program with my students!


# Literacy Instruction and Intervention Materials

The Pre-Primary/Kindergarten teachers at Okemos Public Montessori would like to thank the OEF for awarding a mini grant for the purchase of literacy instruction and intervention materials developed by Sharon Walpole and Michael C. Mc Kenna, How To Plan Differentiated Reading Instruction. The instructional materials include complete lesson plans and student materials including specific criteria for advancing students from one level of instruction to the next including lesson sequences for high ability students.

Because these lesson plans and instructional materials are used by our Learning Center intervention team, for struggling learners, we have had the opportunity to collect data that is consistent between the intervention team and the classroom. Data collected in our first year demonstrated significant growth for those students.

### **State and National English** Conferences

The Okemos High School English department applied for and received a Lee Gerard Professional Development Grant, and an Okemos High School English Language Arts Grant, the latter donated by former OHS English teacher Marcia Tanner and her husband, Bruce Tanner. With this grant funding, members of the English department attended the Michigan Council of Teachers of English (MCTE) conference in East Lansing, Michigan in October, and the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) in Anaheim. California in November and presented at both conferences.

Their presentation talked about the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion iourney the department has been on, as they work to provide texts and learning opportunities for all Okemos High School students. The English department at the high school also wrote an article, published in the Language Arts Journal of Michigan (Volume 38, issue 1), about their journey, the work they have done, and the work they have yet to do. 
# **SPECIAL Projects**

Dawn Reed is currently in her 19th year as an educator. She believes that stories and words matter. She is continually inspired by our amazing OHS students!



In addition to working with Mrs. Sinila's classroom she helps students in all 4th grade classrooms. She is known as Grandma Sharon by everyone at Cornell Elementary School.


# Distinguished Alumni Award-

### Dr. Mark White

Distinguished Alumni Award

Mark White shares his story in Life of a Disease Detective which combines the memoir of his medical school experience with a revised version of the memoir of his work for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, including seven years in the Philippines and two in Uganda.

Mark's humor is legendary as demonstrated by the stories he shares. During his medical school and residency, he sat in the front



row of a Tina Turner concert and enjoyed the mist of saliva. Twice, professors tried to have him thrown out, but the school kept him in.

At CDC, Mark and Budsy, his Filipina wife, were assigned to Manila in the early days of the People Power revolution. With their students, they investigated epidemics of the Ebola virus, typhoid, malaria, and other tropical diseases. They were on the slopes of Mount Pinatubo when it erupted, blasting so much ash into the atmosphere that the global temperature dropped by two degrees C for two years.

Returning to Atlanta, Mark was named Director of the Division of International Health in the Epidemiology Program Office, which supervised global training programs. He created programs in China, Central America, Central Asia, and several other countries.

Budsy and Mark were married for 13 years when she died of breast cancer after a long battle. A year later, he married an old friend, Shelly Ahmann, a breast surgeon. They've been happily married for 24 years.

# UPDATE from the SUPERINTENDENT

### 2022 Bond Program Update

Okemos Public Schools' celebrated the beginning of a significant renovation effort of buildings and grounds in the district made possible by the 2022 bond program with a ribbon cutting ceremony that occurred just before the Wolves's Varsity Football game against Dewitt High School.



The district identified pressing needs of their facilities and grounds through a community steering committee, listening sessions and surveys, and expert-led facilities assessments. In November 2022, the community voted to support a \$275 million bond program to fund projects prioritizing safety and security, creating future-ready learning environments, and upgrading aging infrastructure.





### **Project Scope** (Additional Information at Okemosbond.net)

- The replacement of three buildings that are beyond their useful lives, including Kinawa and Chippewa Middle Schools and Cornell Elementary;
- Building safety enhancements with secure entry vestibules at each school;
- Pressing needs improvements district-wide, as identified in a district-wide facility assessment;
- Improved softball and baseball complex;
- Performing arts, cafeteria, and kitchen expansion at Okemos High School;
- Hiawatha Elementary School redesign of drop-off and pick-up areas for a better traffic flow;
- Furniture replacement and technology improvements, where needed district-wide.



The renovation and additions of secure vestibule entries at Edgewood Early Childhood Center, Bennett Woods, Cornell, and Okemos Public Montessori at Central are nearly finished. The project's next phase will include secure vestibule and main office projects at the High School, the secure vestibule, main office, and carloop improvements at Hiawatha Elementary, and additional utility infrastructure improvements to Central. A refined design solution for the new Chippewa and Kinawa Middle Schools will be presented to the Board of Education in early 2024.

As we continue to enhance our safety and security measures here at Okemos Public Schools, we believe that having the right security personnel who can intervene early on and build strong relationships with students is critical. This is why we have partnered with SEC SHIELD to bring on a new Director of Safety & Security. For more than 10 years, SEC has worked with thousands of schools across the country to create safe learning environments.

We are proud to introduce our new Director of Safety & Security, Katie Diehl.

Katie earned her Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice from Michigan State University. She then went on to serve at the Lansing Police Department for over twenty years, taking on various roles within Special Operations, Investigations, Internal Affairs and Community Outreach. In 2020, Katie took on the leadership role of Captain, for both


> Staff Services and Patrol. In these roles, Katie provided oversight of various community projects and programs, staff training, departmental budgets and commanding over 160+ sworn officers and employees. # Being Equitable in Okemos Public Schools

Being equitable in OPS means that we are creating fair and inclusive learning experiences for all students. Every person has opportunities to thrive and reach their potential. They all get what they need, and needs will differ from person to person. Equity is often mixed up with equality, which means that everyone gets the same support.

### Here are two examples of equity:

- Because she broke her arm, the young woman wrote slower than usual; she was given extra time to take her final exam.
- A student who is not reading at grade level will be invited to summer school, while others who are reading at or above grade level will not.

Last year, several teams of students, staff, caregivers, and community members put parts of the district's equity plan into action.

### Some of the highlights include:

- The Authentic Selves and Relationships team created a short video of many diverse activities that brought OPS students joy during the 2022-23 school year.
- The Instruction, Curriculum and Assessment team gathered information from teachers about their grading practices to better understand current practices. This year, the group will work on recommendations for guidelines to support the district's homework policy.
- The Policy, Practices, and Procedures team and the districtwide DEI Advisory Coalition provided recommendations for improvement of the OPS hiring process. They also examined our processes for incident reporting, which will lead to changes in how incidents of harm are handled.

Building an equitable and inclusive school district is something we must do in partnership with our community. The Okemos Education Foundation has made a commitment to equity in OPS, and they give us opportunities to learn and grow to better support our students. During the 2022-23 school year, OEF funds supported the Okemos Woof Pack, our team of facility dogs, by helping with Phoebe's costs and other program expenses. The Woof Pack continues to motivate, empower, and provide comfort to students and staff alike on a daily basis at OHS (CeCe and Willow), Chippewa (Chip), and Kinawa (Phoebe). This year, the Pack welcomes Bolt at Bennett Woods and Charlie at Hiawatha. Visit the Okemos Woof Pack web site (www.okemoswoofpack.com) for more information.

## Here are some of the equity-related initiatives currently underway in the district:

- We are updating our process for reporting and handling incidents of harm, including bias-related incidents, to ensure that they are clear and accessible. As part of this project, we will be providing professional learning for staff on recognizing and responding to bias.
- The district continues to partner with Child and Family Charities to embed a mental health clinic within Okemos High School as part of the Expanding, Enhancing Emotional Health (E3) grant. The E3 program provides on-site comprehensive mental health services from mild to moderate severity of need with a full-time therapist based within the clinic at OHS five days a week. The therapist serves all youth ages 5-21 within the school district, but primarily focuses on the high school youth. This is not a free service. Many insurance plans are accepted by Child and Family Charities, and there is a sliding fee scale for those without insurance. If the insurance co-pay or fee is a hardship, Child and Family Charities will work with students and families to find a solution.
- Ingham Intermediate School District provides OPS with a mental health therapist who works primarily with students in grades K-8 up to three days per week. The therapist provides one-on-one counseling and group therapy.
- We continue to develop Culturally Responsive Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (CRPBIS) systems for all grade levels.
- A monthly cultural overview is sent to staff to highlight major holidays and events that are likely to connect with our curriculum. All staff have also received a calendar of religious holidays to consider when scheduling assignments, assessments, and events.
- A committee will complete an inventory of current play areas and develop a district standard for accessible play equipment and structures.
- Staff will receive training to ensure that they are familiar with the district's student gender identity policy (Board policy 5106).
- We are establishing an affinity group for staff who identify as BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color). The group will give these staff members time and space to meet one another, share common interests and challenges, and discuss their experiences in the district.
